Poway was not a city until 1980. Twin Peaks Road did not exist between Community Road & Pomerado Road. A review of history of a parish can open up ideas and give inspiration for the future. The point of this book is to tell the story of taking a "spin-off" from a neighboring parish and establishing a new parish with its own identity and culture. St. Gabriel in Poway, California is such a parish. After 50 years, St. Gabriel is still developing its culture and re-inventing itself. As parishioners come and go, it is the faith that stays strong. Where two or more are gathered, God hears our prayers.

In research for this book, I found Father Dollen a very dynamic character. Before there was a building, the parish existed. The leadership of Father Dollen is inspirational. 
Roman Catholic Church and the Diocese of San Diego








Pope John Paul I 1978 (33 days)







In the Beginning...

Daily times-Advocate Escondido, CA Friday, June 22, 1973



Rev. Leo T. Maher, bishop of the San Diego Catholic diocese, has announced the formation of a new parish of more than 300 Catholic families in Poway. The new church will be named after St. Gabriel.

The first masses will be celebrated Sunday at 8:30 and 10 a.m. in the auditorium of Twin Peaks Elementary School in Poway.

The founding pastor of the new parish is Rev. Charles Dollen, librarian at the University of San Diego and book reviewer for the Southern Cross, the weekly newspaper of the San Diego diocese.

Dollen formerly was pastor of St. Louise de Marillac Church in El Cajon. He has been USD librarian since 1968.

St. Gabriel's, the 165th parish in the diocese, was carved out of the southern portion of St. Michael's parish in Poway and part of the northeastern tip of the parish of Church of Good Shepherd.

THE YEAR-END REPORT SHOWED THE FOLLOWING:

Income in 1973 was \$48,787.87 (including \$30,000 from St. Michael's)

Expenses were \$47,643.30 (Including purchasing the land)

Father Dollen's salary was \$2,125 Supply priests \$430 and other salaries \$1,360.50

St. Gabriel paid the school district \$854 rent so they could have Mass on the weekends. In 1973, there was an announcement to the congregation of St. Michael's Parish in Poway that Most Reverend Leo T. Maher, bishop of San Diego Catholic diocese has designated the formation of a new parish of more than 300 Catholic families in Poway. The new church will be named after St. Gabriel.

Reverend Charles Dollen was named the new pastor.

The first Mass took place in the auditorium at Twin Peaks Middle School on the feast of Corpus Christi on June 24, 1973.

During the Mass, they passed a guest book around the congregation and everyone wrote down their family information including phone numbers and addresses. The newly formed women's group took this information and under Father Dollen's guidance, split the city up into 7 areas. Then teams of two visited neighborhoods, knocked on doors and spread the word that there is a new Catholic community in

town and invite people to come. Father Dollen and the group came up with questions and answers to help the teams answer questions such as how to do an annulment, what the plan will be for CCD/Youth and where they can come for spiritual guidance.

few years, the main Sunday Mass was at Twin Peaks either in the auditorium or outside in the cafeteria/courtyard area. In addition, Saturday and daily Masses were held at people's homes usually in the backyard, weather permitting. Friday morning mass was held at the Poway-Bernardo Mortuary Chapel which still exists today. Confession was before Mass by asking Father. Later, when Father had help, he would do confession during Mass while another priest said Mass.

The parishioners of St. Michael's gave St. Gabriel \$30,000 to purchase land which was purchased in 1973. The Women's and Men's ministries were started and were an important part of the church growing. In July, the first Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist, Gene Hunt, was appointed by Bishop Maher to help distribute Communion.

Monsignor Charles Joseph Dollen

Monsignor Dollen loved being a priest. Whenever he drove his car, he announced his delight to the world with a bumper sticker that read: HAPPINESS IS BEING CELIBATE.

His older brother, Father Bernard Dollen and his mother Cecelia Kelly, aware of his deep devotion to the Infant of Prague, always speculated he would someday be ordained.

They were guests of honor for the celebration of the 25th Anniversary of his Ordination in May 1979.

He was born in Rochester, New York, the son of Charles and Cecelia Dollen in 1926. He

completed Seminary at the Immaculate Heart Seminary, El Cajon. He earned a Master of Divinity degree from The University of Southern California, Los Angeles. He was ordained a priest on May 5, 1954.

Father Dollen founded and became the first Director for the Library at the University of San Diego. He held the position for 10 years. From there he became the Pastor of St. Louise de Marillac in Crest, California. There he wrote a book and biography about this parish patron saint. He

returned after several years to USD library and there congruently served as reserve chaplain in the U.S. Navy at the U.S. Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego.

As founding pastor of St. Gabriel's Parish in June, 1973, he said Mass for a small community starting in the Auditorium at Twin Peaks Middle School and daily Mass in people's homes.

A plot of land on Budwin Lane, in the heart of Poway, was purchased as a dream spot for a beautiful church. On September 18, 1977, ground was broken for construction of temporary quarters, consisting of a multipurpose chapel and church hall.





On July 30, 1978, the first Mass was celebrated on a stage that, over the years, became a holy and beautiful altar for each of the 4 Masses celebrated on Saturday vigil and Sunday morning. Approximately 400 members of the congregation sat in chairs for Sunday services. The chairs were easily stored when the space was used for Sunday Bingo. It was intended to be a temporary arrangement.

It was about this time that Father Dollen proclaimed the parish motto, "No one is ever late at St. Gabriel's, just welcome." Father Dollen recruited his good friend from USD, Father Paul Donovan, to assist in the celebration of Sunday Mass. Father Paul was a gifted musician and pianist who loved to play Ragtime music.


Writing beautiful stories was one of Fr. Dollen's passions. He was a prolific writer having authored more than 30 books as well as a 14-volume set of Catholic encyclopedias called THE CATHOLIC TRADITION. He also wrote articles for newspapers and magazines.





Pastor's point of view The Folk Mass

This column space provides pastors and associates an opportunity to write on a subject of their choice and in their own style. As often as we receive suitable contributions, we will print them here. This article is written by Father Charles Dollen, pastor of St. Gabriel's parish, Poway, who also reviews books for SC's "A look at books" column.

In the early 1960s we heard of many experiments with liturgical music and some experiments with the liturgy. They all seemed so remote, even when the bishops at the Second Vatican Council assembled for a eucharistic celebration with African music.

In 1966, the CYO at St. Louise de Marillac church in Crest approached me for a one-time "Folk Mass." They showed me some hymns that looked "far out," songs such as "They will know we are Christian by our love" and "Altogether". With great fear and trepidation I agreed to celebrate the Mass.


IT WAS A very pleasant experience, warm with love and alive with joy. But I figured that a one-time activity was probably exceptional. However, when I told them I liked it, they asked if they could repeat it the following Sunday. I really hesitated—for about two weeks.

We tried it, and most of the adults were pleased. The senior citizens, grandparents, were especially intrigued because they saw the attention and devotion of the young singers and guitar players. There were some middle-aged grumbles, but surprisingly few.

The CYO came at me again, after the Mass. Could they have one Mass each Sunday, they asked, especially for teenagers. How could I refuse, when pastors everywhere were bemoaning the lack of teen-agers at Sunday Mass. And so, St. Louise probably has the right to claim to be the first parish church on the West Coast to have incorporated the Folk Mass into its regular Sunday program.


AND HOW it grew! It was a pleasant pastoral experience to see the church bulging at the seams, Sunday after Sunday. I used to marvel and wonder when the novelty would wear off.

Soon other parishes were asking us to come and start the Folk Mass in their parishes. Christ the King and St. Jude's were among the next to go along. Then the Mexican-American parishes began what we



called "Mariachi Masses," with their own traditional music. Folk Masses are just exactly that—Masses sung by the "folk" of the parish, much the way Gregorian and Ambrosian chant began. They have joined the mainstream of the historical growth of the Liturgy.

I hardly expected that, back in the 1960s.

In the first edition of the Parish Directory in 1977, his Pastoral Message was written like a musical Mission Statement.

That same year, 1977, Father Dollen made history as the first California diocesan priest to be elected to public office. He served for 4 years on the Poway School Board.

His homilies and sermons were notable for their brevity and inspiration, and always relevant to what was read during the Liturgy of the Word. He always had a profound point to make in never more than ten minutes.

He was well respected for the affable tending of his flock. His jovial sense of humor always prevailed in conversations after Mass. He would light up a cigarette and share good old boy jokes with the regulars.

Truth be told, Father Charles Dollen had an aversion to taking on debt and expanding the church campus. His focus was on maintaining what he already had and keeping his flock of sheep comfortable. In February 1982 the parish council received a congratulatory letter from the bishop for paying off the building debt.

During the 1980s Father Dollen would say Mass on Channel 39 Television. He appeared regularly to review books on Channel 39.

In 1985 he was recognized for his skills, abilities, and faithfulness and awarded the honorary title of Monsignor, by Bishop Leo T. Maher.

In May 1986, St. Gabriel's finance committee approved the expansion of the campus and commenced building a Catechetical Center. During Monsignor Dollen's tenure, and under his direction, the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD) was established for the education of children at St. Gabriel's and the use of the Catechetical Center became critical to the instruction of the flock.

In 1996, after twenty-three years of Masses, baptisms and marriages at St. Gabriel's, Monsignor Dollen announced his retirement. The years had passed very quickly for the parish, due to the comfort that his direction and guidance provided. Many cried as the announcement was made and the parishioners felt a tremendous loss.

Monsignor Dollen became ill and went peacefully into the arms of Our Lord on June 5, 1998. He will always be remembered for his extraordinary intellect, his inspired sermons, and his rich sense of humor.

Reverend Foseph Brady (Father Fay)



Father Jay was the pastor at St. Gabriel from 1996 to 1999. He was appointed by Bishop Brom when Monsignor Dollen retired. Even though Father Jay was only with the parish for three years, he was able to pay off the mortgage (from the classrooms/office building addition). The parish celebrated with a picnic at Old Poway Park on Midland Road.

Father Jay made hard decisions which were not always popular. He closed the pre-school and tightened the budget. As Father Michael says "Thanks a million" to Father Jay because when he left in 1999, there was a million dollars in the building fund, which allowed the parish

to begin moving forward with building a new worship space.

Father Jay talked many times about becoming a priest. He was studying law at USD and kept hearing the call to the priesthood while he was there.



His homilies were memorable and along with his props, brought a fresh perspective and understanding of the Gospel readings.

While he was pastor, Father Jay helped with a basic catechist course where many of our catechists learned about the writing of the bible and many other theological topics. He enjoyed visiting the 1st grade classroom to watch the nativity play each year. While at St. Gabriel, he lived in the parish-owned house on Woodhollow Lane. In 1999, he was transferred to St. Katherine Labouré in San Diego. We are grateful for the time Father Jay shared with us.



Very Reverend Michael Froidurot



Father Michael was appointed to St. Gabriel as Pastor on July 1, 1999 and continues to serve our parish in 2023.

Father Michael Froidurot was born and raised in France. In 1961, at 11 years of age, he entered the minor seminary in Flavigny. After completing his baccalaureate in philosophy, he entered the major seminary in Dijon, France. Following the accidental death of his mother when he was 19, he was sent to the American College of Louvain, Belgium to complete his studies in English earning both a BA and MA in theology.

He received a (STB Sacrae Theologiae Baccalaureus) and a STL (Sacrae Theologiae Licentiatus), both canonical and pontifical degrees, at the KUL

(Katholieke Universiteit Leuven) and UCL (Universite Catholique de Louvain). Father Michael was ordained a deacon along with 25 of his classmates in the church of St. Damian of Molokai (Louvain)




Sugnens, Archbishop of Brussels and Mechelen. He was ordained a priest by Cardinal DeCourtay, Archbishop of Dijon, Reims, and Lyon, on May 13, 1978. Young Father Michael was then assigned to a parish in Nuits St. Georges, and in 1981 as a Priest Principal in a Catholic High School in Dijon, France.

In 1986, he arrived in San Diego where he served as associate pastor in various parishes (St. Mary's in Escondido, Our Mother of Confidence, Our Lady of Mount Carmel). He was appointed pastor of St. Charles Borromeo in Point Loma in 1994. He has also served on the Priests' Personnel Board and was Dean of the Escondido Deanery.

In 2004, St. Gabriel's acquired 6 acres of land north of our campus for the construction of the new church. The rectory house on Woodhollow was sold and the residence on Budwin Lane was purchased to gain road access to the 6 acre lot. Fundraising for the new worship space started in 2006. A year later the bankruptcy of the diocese and the collapse of the stock market brought the

project to a halt. Logic and reason would have suggested abandoning what would obviously become a failure, Father Michael turned to prayer and looked to the Blessed Mother in Lourdes, France, for help. It was the Blessed Mother who asked Bernadette to go and tell the parish priest of Lourdes to build a Church so people would come and pray. When he heard the request the parish priest said to Bernadette, "Does your Lady have money?" It was through the power of prayer that her intercession brought forth the transformation of Lourdes. And so, it was at St. Gabriel. It was through the miracle of prayers that the hearts of people of goodwill were changed. As a result, we have a beautiful worship space where the presence of our Lord

is evident through sacraments, prayer services, and moments of quiet contemplation.

The design of the church was inspired by the California Mission style with a European influence. When visiting Lourdes, Father Michael saw the artistic work of Sister Mercedes at the papal altar and the baptistry of the parish church. He convinced her to create the statues that ornate the base of our altar. His childhood friend, a sculptor, was commissioned to carve from one block of marble the statue of the risen Christ. Our bells were cast at a French foundry and the retablo behind the altar is from Arte Granda, a company in Spain, established by a priest whose mission in life was to save religious art from destruction. Father's annual trips home to Europe included researching and talking with people who could help bring his vision of St. Gabriel Church to fruition.

Father is part of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem. In 2015, he was elevated to the rank of commander. According to the Vatican Website: The Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem is the only lay institution of



the Vatican State charged with the task of providing for the needs of the Latin Patriarchate of Jerusalem and of all the activities and initiatives to support the Christian presence in the Holy Land. Our collection on Good Friday is

donated to this worthy cause. Also, occasionally, you will see items from Jerusalem sold in our courtyard to help support Christians in the Holy Land.

Father Michael encouraged many men and women to enter the religious and consecrated life. Three men were ordained deacon for the service of our parish. We look forward to the ordination of parishioner, Sean Embry, who is in formation at St. Francis Seminary.

Father Michael believes that traveling is a necessary part of the learning process and when a Vatican display came to the Reagan Presidential Library, he took a group of parishioners on a bus trip to visit the exhibit. In 2022, he led a pilgrimage to Europe to see the Oberammergau Passion Play in Germany. He will be taking another group in 2023 on a Lourdes and Italy Pilgrimage.

On the 40th anniversary of his ordination, Father Michael's family and priest friends came to St. Gabriel's to celebrate this special occasion at an exquisite banquet prepared by Michel Malecot from The French Gourmet.

The time of the mandatory retirement for Father Michael as a pastor is approaching (2025). He plans to go to France and enjoy his family for a few years. A new pastor will be appointed by the personnel board and the Bishop. In 2028, Father Michael will celebrate the 50th anniversary of his Ordination. He plans to come back to St. Gabriel to celebrate this joyful occasion. As Monsignor Dollen did many years before him, he will settle in Poway. He will call Poway home, adding more years to the 25 beautiful years of his life spent here as Pastor; an inspiring way to prepare for Eternity.

Father John Cloonan was the first priest listed in the directories as a "Sunday Assistant" for Father Dollen in the 1978 and 1982 directories.




Reverend Joseph McDonnell Born: September 16, 1919, Entered Eternity: March 9, 1998 Ordained: June 25, 1950

Born in Portland, Oregon, but grew up in Olympia, Washington. Taught at University of San Diego and was part of St. Gabriel's March 1982 into the 1990s celebrating the 8 am Mass.


Reverend Paul A. Donovan, S.J. (Society of Jesus) Born: January 5, 1927, Entered Eternity: September 9, 2016 Ordained: June 17, 1956

Father Donovan, a good friend of Monsignor Dollen, helped celebrate Mass on the weekends. He celebrated his Golden Jubilee at St. Gabriel's in 1993. He played "Cocktail Piano" at the bingo dinner on Sunday afternoons. His hobbies were Piano, Bird Study, History of Military, History of Films.

In an interview with Joan Friesenhahn, a founding parishioner, she noted: "Father Donovan would give a fire and brimstone sermon and then would be a completely joyful person after Mass. He was always the life of a party and an amazing musician. He would play wonderful songs on the piano at our choir get togethers at Frank Borman's house."

Father Hal came to St. Gabriel in 2000. He was retired, but very active. He celebrated daily and weekend Masses until 2019. Father Hal and Father Michael collaborated on a few projects including teaching about the Mass.

> Father Hal had a special devotion to the Virgin Mary. It was Mary's voice in a vision that led him to the priesthood at the age of 47. During his time at St. Gabriel's,




he introduced Intercessory Prayer and many groups were formed under his guidance. He was also instrumental in bringing healing Masses to St. Gabriel's.

During the pandemic and in his last couple of years, when he was housebound, he made phone calls to those on the prayer list. He truly cared for us.

Reverend Patrick Murphy Ordained: June 6, 1997, San Diego


Father Pat serves as Senior Associate at St. Gabriel. He was accepted into the program for priestly formation for the Diocese of San Diego in 1991. He completed his undergraduate degree in religious studies at USD and went on to complete his graduate studies at St. Patrick Seminary in Menlo Park earning a Master in Divinity and a Bachelors in Sacred Theology. His first assignment was Associate Pastor at St. Patrick in Carlsbad in 1997. In March of 1998, he was appointed as vocation director for the diocese at St. Francis seminary and served as a spiritual director to the seminarians. He then became the coordinator of spiritual directors for the Permanent Diaconate Formation program and served in that position for 18 years. Father Pat served as pastor at Immaculate Heart of Mary in Ramona, Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Peñasquitos, and Immaculate Conception in Old Town. In 2016, he received his Graduate Degree in Spiritual Direction and Directed Retreats from Creighton University. 

He also is the Naval Consolidated Brig MCAS Miramar Chaplain. Father Jim enjoys playing Bridge and jogging.

Reverend Christopher Merris, CAPT, CHC, USN (Ret.)

Ordained: July 9, 1982, San Diego

Father Chris was ordained for the diocese of San Diego on July 9, 1982. 



Deacon Bob Troy Ordained: June 8, 2007 Born July 19, 1954, Entered Eternity: August 1, 2016

Deacon Bob joined St. Gabriel's parish in April of 1987, when he and his family moved to Poway. Prior to his ordination, Deacon Bob joined the Knights of Columbus and served the parish as a Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion at Mass and to the homebound.

Deacon Bob experienced a powerful calling to the diaconate after his brain tumor diagnosis in December 2000. Although his prognosis was very poor, by the grace of God, his cancer went into remission for almost 8 years.

Deacon Bob entered the diaconate training program in September of 2003.

He loved learning more about the teachings of the Catholic Church in his classes and enjoyed fellowship opportunities in the monthly days of reflection and annual retreats with other deacon candidates.

He was very enthusiastic about the outreach service activities that the formation program provided. Deacon Bob was involved in prison ministry, leading Bible studies at the Metropolitan Correctional Institute in downtown San Diego. He also served at an AIDS hospice in Escondido, was a counselor in legal matters at the Brother Benno Foundation in Oceanside and was a minister to the sick at Scripps Memorial Hospital in Encinitas.

After his ordination, a day of great joy, Deacon Bob served





at St. Gabriel as the deacon at Masses, gave homilies, performed Baptisms, conducted Eucharistic Adoration services, officiated at funerals and Rites of Committal, and prepared annulment documents. He was also involved with the pro-life and homebound Holy Communion ministries. In addition, Deacon Bob served as the spiritual advisor to the North County Chapter of Magnificat, a ministry to Catholic women which focuses on faith testimonials.



Deacon Mike Fish Ordained: May 28, 2010, San Diego

Deacon Mike Fish went through RCIA at St. Gabriel and entered the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil in 2001. His wife Joy helped in many ways at the parish including teaching religious education and assisting Deacon Mike with his presentations. She also worked in the parish office.

Deacon Ricardo Elizondo Ordained: May 25, 2012

Deacon Ricardo was appointed to St. Gabriel. Currently he is coordinator of the Extraordinary Ministers of Communion at the parish. He also trains ministers from across the Diocese. He serves as a spiritual guide for our youth, and as a speaker and advisor for Religious Education. He frequently speaks and helps with retreats. Deacon Ricardo teaches the Baptism preparation class and has baptized many children. He assists our priests at several Sunday Masses each week. His skill of communicating in both English and Spanish has been an asset to the parish. We are blessed to have him. We asked for his bio and true to his articulate talent, he gave us a personal perspective:

How Deacon Ricardo Became a Deacon by Deacon Ricardo Elizondo

I was born in 1964 in Ciudad Obregon, which is a city in the state of Sonora in the northwestern part of Mexico. I am the seventh of eight children. I was always the shy, studious type (your typical nerd) always careful to take care of all my duties. We lived a block away from the local Cathedral and I remember that when I was a preteen, I would get up early on Sundays to go to 7am Mass to make sure I checked that box early.

When I was 25 and was working in Mexico as a computer programmer, I won a scholarship and the opportunity to get a masters in the U.S. It was in graduate school in Phoenix Arizona where I met my wife, Cynthia. After we got married, we lived for 3 years in Mexico and then moved back to the U.S. After living for 5 years in the San Francisco Bay Area, we moved to San Diego in the year 2000.


During all this time I had been what I call a "satellite Catholic". That means that I was comfortably "in orbit" around Church: not too far to be flung out to outer space but not too close for a crash landing. I kept a close but safe distance.

All that changed around 2002, when I was 38, during a casual conversation with one of my brothers talking about acquaintances that went through tragic events

which led them to God. This got me to think whether I was waiting for a tragedy to move closer to God myself. Being the analytical type, I embarked in a long investigation to discover whether I truly believed in God or not, so that I could live my life accordingly.

Two years and many books later the jury was still out, but then I got my hands on Mere Christianity by C.S. Lewis. There was something in that very simple and yet very deep little book that just floored me. When I put the book down I knew that God had me in a corner like saying "it is now your time to decide, are you in or are you out?". With the trepidation of knowing that my life would forever change, I told him "I am in". This was around 2004.

From that moment on my life started changing rapidly. One of the first things I did was to make an appointment with Father








Michael. Even though we had already been parishioners at St. Gabriel for 4 years, I did not really know him yet. When we met, I told him that I had just made the decision to take God seriously and wanted his advice on books and prayers. He listened to me in silence and then he asked "have you thought of being a deacon?". I was so surprised by his sudden question that my answer came out of my mouth before I could stop it, "I am sorry, but I don't kiss on the first date!" I started getting more and more involved in the Church (I started going to all 5 weekend Masses!), became a Lector and Minister of Communion, and a little over 3 years later, I went back to Father Michael to tell him "I think I am ready now".

The four and a half years of diaconate preparation were a wonderful whirlwind. It was great to be with like-minded, like-hearted people busy learning about our common Love. I was ordained deacon on May 25, 2012 and it is one of the brightest highlights of my life.

The diaconate has provided me and my family irreplaceable graces. I can honestly say that there is no waking hour when I do not think of God, and I cherish my moments with Him. The life of a deacon is much more demanding than many imagine but I love every second of it. Of what I do, my greatest loves are the Holy Mass, the youth, and preaching. I cannot get enough of any of the three!

A popular career advice says, "do what you love and you will never work a single day". I would change it to this, "follow God's calling and you will always keep your joy". I love God with all my heart, and I love being His deacon. His calling for me is a constant source of joy.









As of May 2023, Deacon Ricardo has welcomed over 300 baptized in the church.
